

Library of Congress Tour, February 6, 2018

This past February, ACES students at the Montgomery College Rockville and Germantown campuses were invited to a private tour of the Library of Congress' Music Division. The Library of Congress is the world's largest library, with a growing collection of more than 164 million items on 838 miles of bookshelves. The collection also houses 3.6 million recordings, 14 million photographs, 8.1 million pieces of sheet music and 70 million manuscripts. How grateful we are to Bob Lipartito, Music Reference Specialist, who organized a tour of the Jefferson Building, and then welcomed us to view special Library of Congress music gems, including a Mozart original score, an original letter from Michael Jackson to Leonard Bernstein, and even a lock of Beethoven's hair! Mr. Lipartito also spoke to

the students about his "Arts Career path", reconfirming the importance of always being aware of "adjusting" one's goals/path – no matter what career you choose. His generous, joyous and inclusive spirit, coupled with his excellence in presenting the array of scores/manuscripts truly made our visit an extra special one!
